



Celebrating Transformation

Winter has made its mark this year as the combination of consistent snowfall and extremely cold temperatures has led to school closures. I want to thank our parents and guardians for their continued flexibility in navigating the disruption these “snow days” can cause to your routine. We review each situation locally and in communication with our County Superintendents Association. My hope is that we can get through the winter without exceeding our annual allotment of six days from the Michigan Department of Education.

I want to thank our voters again for their support of the 2025 Facilities Bond. We are currently working with our construction manager and architect to finalize the construction schedule for the approved projects. Design efforts for the initial group of projects will begin in 2026, with construction to follow in 2027.

I’m also excited to share that the board has approved refinancing the 2016 Series 1 Facility Improvement Bonds, which represents continued fiscal responsibility on behalf of the district. While this refinancing doesn’t generate additional revenue for facilities improvements, it does allow the district to pay off the debt sooner. We learned from our legal counsel and financial advisor that refinancing this debt is achieving some of the highest savings they have seen in several years.

This year also sees the launch of our new “RCS Strategic Framework” that not only helped to reauthorize our Strategic Plan in its third year, but is now the benchmark for district improvement efforts for years to come. We have learned through the Ford Next Generation Learning (NGL) network that their three transforming strands can guide systemic efforts PK-12. We have included a fourth strand around improving facilities and infrastructure.

Thank you for your continued support of our district.

FALL SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

Cross Country

Our girls and boys teams dominated again, making their way to the state finals. Both girls and boys varsity and JV teams were named MAC Red and MAC champions and the girls and boys varsity teams were regional champions. The boys placed 14th in the state and the girls placed second.

Football

Romeo Football celebrated 100 years this fall! The varsity team finished the regular season 6-3 and were named MAC Red Champions and District Champions, finishing eighth in the state.

Girls Golf

The team moved up to the MAC Red this season and set a record of 166 at the last regular match of the season.

Boys Soccer

The varsity team finished the regular season with a 15-2-6 record, setting a school record of 13 shutouts. Finishing undefeated at home, the team were named MAC Red Champions and back-to-back District Champions.

Boys Tennis

The varsity team finished the regular season with a 7-5 record, placing second in the MAC Red.

Girls Swim

The team placed fourth at the County Meet and was named MAC White Team Champions. Alyssa Chambers was the MAC White MVP and was a MAC White Individual Champion along with Izzy Greco, Harper Savage and Giselle Stone. The 200 Medley Relay team of Alyssa Chambers, Izzy Greco, Harper Savage and Giselle Stone placed 14th in the state and Alyssa Chambers earned All-State status.

Volleyball

The varsity team finished the season with a 28-11-1 record. The district champions were also in the Top 16 in the state and were named the Macomb County Team of the Year.

Coach Accolades

Cross country Coach **Mike Buslepp** was named MAC Red and MHSAA Girls Cross Country Coach of the Year.

Varsity football Coach **Curt Rienas** was named MAC Red Coach and Region 4 Coach of the Year.

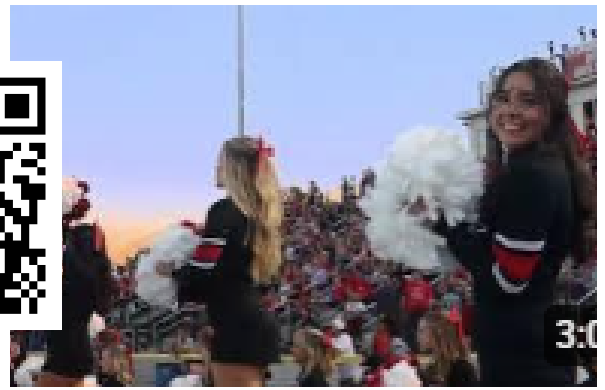

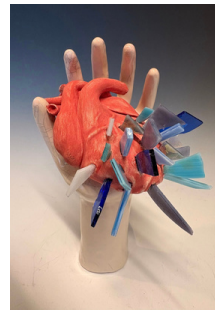
